OCCUPATIONAL & ENVIRONMENTAL MEDICINE CLERKSHIP SYLLABUS

Objectives:

- 1. To give the student the opportunity to practice taking an occupational and environmental history.
- 2. To teach the student the occupational and environmental differential of common conditions seen in primary care.
- 3. To teach the student about the approaches to preventing occupational and environmental disease.
- 4. To teach the student about the interface between community primary care and the special factors affecting worker health by familiarizing the student with selective workplaces.
- 5. To give an overview of the field of Occupational & Environmental Medicine including legal and ethical issues.

Responsibilities:

- 1. The student will complete five occupational and environmental histories per week.
- 2. The student will attend an occupational and environmental disease clinic in his or her community 1 to 2 mornings per week.
- 3. The student will accompany an industrial hygienist from a district office of the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs into two different workplaces/week.
- 4. The student will observe 1-2 legal depositions.
- 6. The student will, under supervision, be responsible for a mutually agreed upon independent project.

Location:

The clerkship is available in Lansing. With special arrangements, it is also available in the other MSU communities.

OCCUPATIONAL MEDICINE CLERKSHIP SYLLABUS (CONTINUED)

Evaluation:

Based on the student's occupational histories, independent project, patient presentations and discussion which reflects preparation, consulting text and relevant literature.

Readings:

Levy, Wegman, Baron and Sokas, Occupational and Environmental Health, Recognizing and Preventing Work-Related Disease, 6th Edition, 2011; and selective journal articles.

Grades and Credits:

The clerkship can be taken for a minimum of four weeks (6 credits) up to a maximum of eight weeks (12 credits). Grading is pass/fail. The final clerkship grade is determined by the Clerkship Coordinator in the Department of Medicine.
